Prayer for the Elect

Politics Unstemmed

President Barack Obama unleashed federally-funded research on embryonic stem cells this month. And from the hosannas one would think that science was really about to save us all.

The glee with which scientists and others greeted the news contrasts sharply with the failure, thus far, to deliver a successful therapy based on stem cells from human embryos. Meanwhile, adult stem cells have proven useful in developing life-saving therapies. These have the happy side effect of not terminating human life.

Even if embryonic stem cells were practical in curing or halting disease, it would be wrong to save one life by ending another. Utility can never be the measure of morality.

We should remember that Obama did not open the floodgates on killing embryos. Researchers are still subject to a Congressional ban, renewed annually, on using taxpayer dollars on research that destroys an embryo.

And we should remember that neither President Bush nor Clinton were pure on this subject. Both sought to circumvent the Congressional restriction with policies that allowed research on stem cells derived privately from embryos, that is, if someone else paid for it.

But the Obama rule allows research on new stem cell lines developed in private labs. So the executive order encourages research that will lead, indirectly, to the termination of more human life. He basically outsourced the killing.

To say that his action frees science to operate without political interference is a great deception. The point of politics is to decide how our society and government should operate.

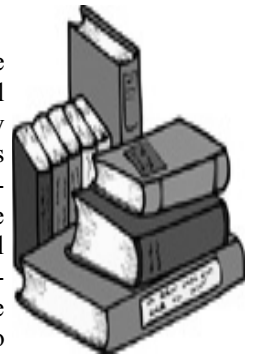
Yes, keep open the doors to all available and ethically-derived scientific knowledge.

But as Cardinal Justin Rigali said, the new policy encourages the destruction of life and treats human embryos "as mere products to be harvested."

Just because science can does not mean it should.

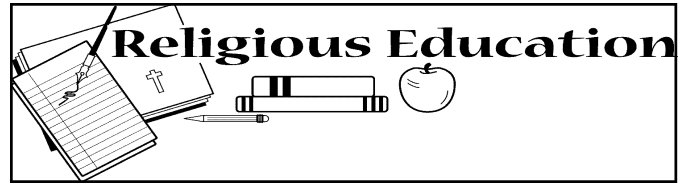

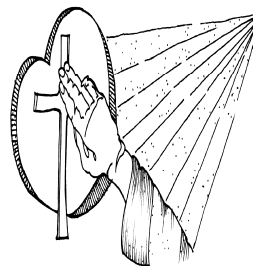

John's gospel reading begins with the Greeks' request of Philip, *"Sir, we would like to see Jesus."* Jesus responds by revealing His life purpose to honor and glorify God. Do you see Jesus' presence in others who are selfless? How do you die to self as you serve your family, community, and your God?*

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Over the next week, as we hear of the interior anguish of Jesus, we are led to the Garden of Gethsemane, the scene of a night of suffering, failure, and loss. In Hebrew, the word means "olive press," and it was an olive grove, although only a few trees remain. Olives can't be eaten off the trees, they need to be cured: knocked from the trees at harvest time, scooped into a stone basin, and cracked open by a heavy millstone. The crushing stone weight was itself called a "gethsemane," and once it was lowered onto the olives, oil from the fruit and the inner stone would drip into a groove and flow into jars. The night before his death, Jesus experienced such anguish that scripture says his own blood perspired from him, an image no one who understands olive oil production could miss.

Today, the Mount of Olives is within the city of Jerusalem and the site of the Church of All Nations, also known as the Basilica of the Agony. It was built in 1924, funded by Catholics in twelve different countries. There's an open-air altar on the grounds that is used by Anglicans on Holy Thursday every year. Nearby is the Russian Church of Mary Magdalene, built by the czar in 1888, its magnificent golden domes a distinctive landmark. There is also another tiny Catholic Church, called *Dominus Flevit*, or "The Cry of the Lord," built in a teardrop shape in the mid-1950s. For centuries, the Franciscan order has had the care of the shrines of the Holy Land, and our Good Friday collection helps sustain these precious sites.

A Family Perspective by Bud Ozar: Today's gospel teaches: "Whoever loves his life, loses it." Letting go and death to self are keys to successful relationships. If we hold-onto another too tightly, we smother them. Unless we die to ourselves, we use others for our needs. Hear Jesus today: "If the grain of wheat dies, there is much fruit." Family life and relationships require sacrifice.

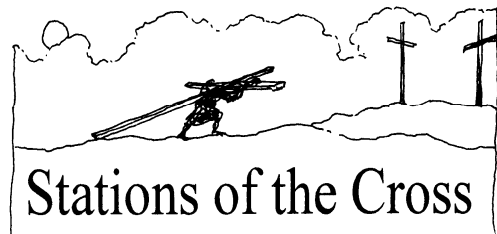
