From the Pastor's Desk

Next weekend we will be taking up the annual appeal for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development. Since 1970, CCHD has worked with groups of poor persons throughout our nation in their efforts to help themselves better the life situation of their families and communities. As I try to do in the bulletin every year, I wish to share with you some reflections about CCHD because it has been a program that remains close to my heart having taught me so much over the years.

CCHD is not a direct service program in the sense that it hands out food, or provides clothing and shelter directly to the poor. Many other Church outreach programs do that. CCHD was founded by the Bishops of the United States to work at the grass roots level in poor urban and rural communities in order to combat the root causes of poverty. Organized groups of poor persons may apply for assistance to work for such things as the creation of jobs for the poor and low-income community, improve housing conditions, better educational opportunities and provide for essential health care. Farming programs have been helped along with programs deeply rooted in the center city of large urban areas. In our own diocese, over the years, CCHD has funded numerous programs to help the poor help themselves. That is the philosophy of CCHD. While CCHD may not fund direct services, it does provide funding for organizations to establish those services and at the same time secure long range funding for them from other sources.

In a recent memo to the Bishops of the United States, Bishop Roger Morin who chairs the Bishops' Conference subcommittee for CCHD pointed out the following statistics.

- 250 current groups of low-income people throughout the country have been helped to lift themselves from poverty to live in dignity. Each of these groups has been carefully reviewed for conformity to Catholic teaching and approved by the local Bishop for funding. They work on job creation, crime prevention, housing, immigration, and other vital issues.
- CCHD currently has assisted economic development initiatives in 18 different communities, including employment, housing, and urban and rural development.
- CCHD has advanced the mission of Catholic social teaching throughout the country with education efforts to share the Church's principles and their implications in the midst of this economic turmoil.
- CCHD's "Poverty USA" campaign has been recognized several times as one of the best public service campaigns in the nation.

The Catholic Campaign for Human Development is deeply integrated into the life of the Catholic community. For example, in 2008, CCHD funded groups involving 683 Catholic priests, 776 Catholic parishes, 18 Catholic Charities agencies and 51 religious communities to name a few.

In the interest of total frankness, we have to admit that from its inception, CCHD has not enjoyed the support of every Catholic in this country. While the vast majority of Catholics have embraced this Campaign and made it one of the most successful anti-poverty outreach efforts in the history of the Catholic Church in the United States, there are some persons who sincerely believe that the Church has no business in organizing efforts among the poor. Various opponents label CCHD as radical or liberal, even anti-capitalist, and embrace the view that the poor are not really helped because there is no direct service such as food, clothing or shelter. Usually these persons support the direct service approach, that is, a sandwich at the door, a place to stay for the homeless person at night, a food pantry for the indigent and all such other important outreach. I believe that these are good people who often sincerely wish to help the poor, but see the CCHD approach as not consistent with what they believe the Church ought to be all about when it comes to the poor.

Occasionally I read observations made that CCHD has funded projects that have components contrary to the teachings of the Catholic Church. I'm sure that in the thirty-five plus years of CCHD mistakes have been made. I am equally sure that whenever the specter of inappropriate funding has been raised, those issues have been addressed immediately and completely. Recently CCHD has ceased funding programs related in any way with a national organizing group called ACORN. In the past three years CCHD funding has been curtailed and finally ceased for any group affiliated with ACORN. That remains in place even now. Questions raised about ACORN's activities in terms of financial accountability, partisanship and inappropriate voting registration practices need to be addressed and resolved. When issues in this regard were raised, the Bishops who oversee CCHD acted immediately and appropriately. I repeat here, again, that no group was ever funded unless it had the approbation of the local Bishop or CCHD diocesan director.

Jesus said, "Whatever you do for one of these, the least of mine, you do for me." Direct service to the poor is essential to the integrity of our living and preaching the Gospel. Yet there is another dimension. It is empowering people to help themselves; to gather with others like themselves and to work to improve their own conditions and thus live in the dignity that is God's will for every person and family. In addition to direct service to the poor, there is always the need for the Church to walk in solidarity with the poor, as they struggle to advocate for themselves. That is the vision of CCHD from its inception and it remains so today. I hope that our Catholic community is justifiably proud of all that CCHD has accomplished since its founding over thirty-five years ago. It has been one of the few anti-poverty programs that has survived the vicissitudes of time and financial ups and downs. The Catholic people have been overwhelmingly supportive of CCHD. It is a support I personally adopt for myself. For more information you may log on to the website for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and that will lead you to the CCHD site.

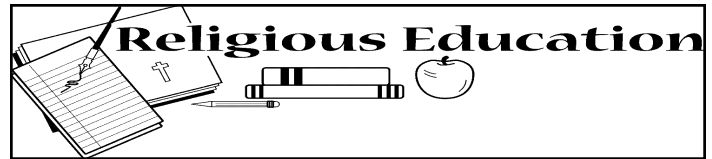

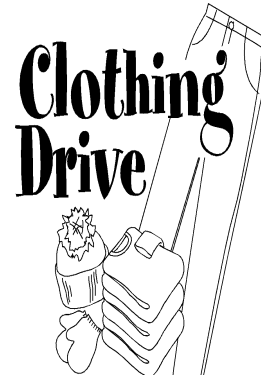
